### Course syllabus

#### Aims:

To understand art in the context of the history of the Dutch Republic

To examine the development of the development of domestic life painting in Holland, with especial reference to Nicholas Maes, Gerard ter Borch and Jan Steen

To recognise the significance of emblematic symbolism in the pictures studied

#### Content:

This course looks at the Dutch Republic of the seventeenth century and its distinguishing values and culture reflected in the paintings of domestic life.

The course will include;

- 1. A brief history of the emergent nation.
- 2. The development of domestic life painting
- 3. The significance of the emblematic symbolism underpinning many pictures
- 4. Detailed analysis of representative pictures especially by, Nicholas Maes, Gerard ter Borch and Jan Steen

#### Presentation of the course:

Illustrated lectures with discussion throughout. There will also be a small selection of books available for students to study.

#### **Outcomes:**

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- 1. Appreciate the contribution of Dutch painting to the development of Western Art
- 2. Understand the significance of the Dutch values embodied in the themes depicted.
- 3. Recognise the distinctive stylistic innovations of the three artists
