#### Aims:

#### Presentation of the course:

The class will read the text and create an agreed translation through contributions from participants. There will be a full discussion of the author's style and, where appropriate, an analysis of the language used.

#### **Outcomes:**

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an increased appreciation and enjoyment of the reading of texts in Latin
- 2. Show an improved knowledge of Latin grammar and vocabulary
- 3. Translate orally from Latin into English more effectively
- 4. Demonstrate an enhanced appreciation of literary style
- 5. Show a greater understanding of the context within which the texts were written
