Course syllabus

Aims:

Students should be able to extend their knowledge of basic patterns of Greek grammar and syntax. In addition, they should be able to develop their appreciation of literary style and increase their understanding of the historical and cultural context of the passages they are studying.

Content:

Students must provide their own copies of the text

Group A Advanced Greek Verse: Pindar. Stephen Instone (ed.) Pindar: *Selected Odes* (Olympian 1; Pythian 9; Nemeans 2, 3; Isthmian 1) (Aris and Phillips, 1996).

Group B Advanced Greek Prose: Herodotus book 8, Chapters 40-96. Recommended editions: A. Bowie (ed.) Herodotus *Histories Book VIII* (CUP, 2007) or J.E. Powell (ed.), Herodotus *Book 8* (repr. Bristol Classical Press, 1991)

Group C Intermediate Greek: JACT *A Greek Anthology* (CUP, 2002), Section 3, Herodotus *Histories* and Section 4, Aeschylus *The Persians,* + further passages from both works (to be supplied).

Group D Continuing Beginners: JACT *Reading Greek* (2nd edition, CUP, 2007), starting at Chapter 12.

Group E Continuing Beginners: JACT *Reading Greek* (2nd edition, CUP, 2007), starting at Chapter 8.

Presentation of the course:

Students work in small groups with their tutor. They prepare the sections of the course book or the passages of Greek Literature to be read before they come. This gives plenty of opportunity for discussion and further exploration of the historical background or explanation of features of the language.

Outcomes:

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- 1. Recognise some new features of Greek language;
- 2. Recognise more vocabulary;
- 3. Have learned to recognise some new idiomatic uses;
- 4. Feel more confident about their ability to translate from Greek into English;
- 5. Feel that they are developing a sense of the style of different literary genres or authors;
- 6. Feel that they have learned something more about the background to the language and literature they are studying.
