Tutor biography

David studied Classics at the University of Hull in the early seventies and stayed to complete his PGCE in order to become a Classics teacher. He has taught Classics in the maintained sector throughout his career at several different schools, including a spell as an Advisory Teacher with Northamptonshire. After obtaining an MA in Educational Management, he went on to become headteacher firstly at the Birkbeck School in Lincolnshire and later at the Kingswood School in Corby – an 11-18 comprehensive school which offered students the opportunity to study Latin. Now retired from headship, David continues to work with the University of Northampton and still teaches Latin. He is a former Chief Examiner for GCSE Latin with OCR, former Chair of the Joint Association of Classical Teachers.

Course syllabus

Aims:

- 1. to appreciate and enjoy the reading of texts in Latin.
- 2. to extend knowledge of Latin grammar, syntax and vocabulary.
- 3. to develop the ability to translate orally from Latin into English.
- 4. to develop an appreciation of literary style.
- 5. to appreciate the context in which the texts were written

Content:

Presentation of the course:

The class will read the text and create an agreed translation through contributions from participants. There will be a full discussion of the author's style and, where appropriate, an analysis of the language used.

Outcomes:

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an increased appreciation and enjoyment of the reading of texts in Latin.
- 2. show an improved knowledge of Latin grammar, syntax and vocabulary.
- 3. translate orally from Latin into English more effectively.
- 4. demonstrate an enhanced appreciation of literary style.
- 5. show a greater understanding of the context within which the texts were written.
