Course syllabus

Aims:

- 1. to extend knowledge of Latin grammar, syntax and vocabulary
- 2. to appreciate and enjoy the reading of texts in Latin.
- 3. to develop the ability to translate orally from Latin into English.
- 4. to develop an appreciation of literary style.
- 5. to appreciate the context in which the texts were written

Content:

The course will be based on *The Cambridge Latin Anthology* which contains a selection of passages from both verse and prose authors; each passage has a running vocabulary.

The tutor will explain and discuss fully the grammar and syntax and course members will be encouraged to discuss the content and style of each passage.

Students must provide their own copies of *The Cambridge Latin Anthology* ISBN 9780521578776 Price 12.75

Presentation of the course:

Reading the text as a group, followed by discussion of the style of the individual passages, where appropriate.

Thorough analysis of the language structures and full explanation of both grammar and syntax as required.

Outcomes:

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- 1. show an improved knowledge of Latin grammar, syntax and vocabulary.
- 2. demonstrate an increased appreciation and enjoyment of the reading of texts in Latin.
- 3. translate orally from Latin into English more effectively.
- 4. demonstrate an enhanced appreciation of literary style.
- 5. show a greater understanding of the context within which the texts were written.
