Course syllabus

Aims:

1. To consider some of the mythical journeys of the classical world

2. To consider some of the ways in which Greeks and Romans travelled round the classical world

3. To appreciate the value of primary written sources for studying ancient travel

4. To evaluate the visual evidence for ancient travel

Content:

Students will have the opportunity to consider the variety of travel across the Greek and Roman world.

We shall begin with some familiar travellers and their journeys from the mythical world and reflect on the reality of these journeys. A session will be devoted to exploring why some Greeks and Romans travelled so far and so frequently, and a further session will briefly look at maps and directions for travellers. We shall then concentrate on specific types of travel and areas where it may have been preferable not to travel, e.g. deserts. Finally we shall join a number of travellers on their journeys, by reading their own accounts of their experiences.

Presentation of the course:

The course will be taught through tutor-led presentations and full class discussions. Each session will combine examining literary evidence and where possible this evidence will be supplemented with images from the classical world of modes of transport; students will be encouraged to discuss what they read and see and to interpret the evidence and reflect on its reliability.

All texts will be in English, but some words or terms may be given in the original Greek or Latin as well as in English.

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- Discuss with confidence both the literary and the visual evidence for travel in the Greek and Roman worlds
- Evaluate this evidence
- Feel confident in using primary material
- Develop empathy with ancient Greek and Roman travellers
