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### Tutor biography

Dr John Taylor was educated at Balderstone School, Rochdale and Exeter College, Oxford, where he obtained his MA and DPhil. Following this, he was a full time Classics teacher from 1982-2012. He was Head of Classics at St Francis Xavier's College in Liverpool, 1986-92, and then Head of Classics at Tonbridge School from 1992-2012. He became a Lecturer in Classics at the University of Manchester from 2015. He has also been a tutor on the JACT Greek Summer School at Bryanston since 1986 (where he was Director of Studies from 1993-2004, and Director in 2007-8, 2011 and 2016). He has been a panel tutor at ICE since 1993.

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## Course syllabus

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### Aims:

To read New Testament passages in Greek, and to understand their language and background, with short extracts from the Septuagint for comparison.

### Content:

Matthew chapters 5, 6 and 7

Acts chapter 1 and chapter 2 verses 1-21

I Corinthians chapters 13, 14 and 15

Genesis chapter 11 verses 1-11 and chapter 22 verses 1-19

The course involves study of Greek grammar and vocabulary, as well as the historical, literary and theological background of the texts being read.

### Presentation of the course:

The sessions consist of oral presentation and class discussion. Students read aloud and translate (in turn, and with suitable help) extracts from texts they have prepared in advance. Linguistic features and subject matter are explained and discussed, taking account of differing interpretations where appropriate.

**As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:**

1. Read New Testament Greek with greater fluency and enjoyment: grammar and vocabulary will be explained, revised and consolidated. Allowance will be made for students with different levels of Greek.
2. Have increased knowledge of literary genres and of the historical circumstances in which the texts were written: we shall consider how ancient readers might have approached New Testament texts based on their familiarity with the Jewish scriptures and/or classical literature.
