# **Tutor biography**

Vera Tsareva-Brauner is an Affiliated Lecturer at the Department of Slavonic Studies, Faculty of Modern and Medieval Languages where she teaches and examines a number of language tripos, including Translation from English into Russian and Russian through Audio-Visual. She is also an external examiner for Russian at UCL, City University London, University of Westminster and Eton.

Vera is also a Coordinator of Cambridge University Russian Language Programmes (CULP) where she teaches a variety of Russian language courses from Ab Initio to Advanced and Russian Through Film and Culture to Cambridge undergraduates, post-graduates and post-doctoral students.

Her research focuses on literary and cultural heritage of post-1917 Russian emigration in France. She is particularly interested in the aspect of memory in Russian and Soviet discourse. Vera is also an author, translator and editor.

Vera graduated from St Petersburg University with BA (Hons) and MA, and later did her post-graduate degree at Manchester University.

## Course syllabus

## Aims:

- To learn about political, historical and cultural background to modern-day's nostalgia for 'all things Soviet'.
- To be able to analyse and reflect on the current position Russia occupies in the world.
- To find out more about what it was really like living in the USSR: facts and fiction.

#### Content:

Almost 30 years after the collapse of the USSR, nostalgia for the Soviet era has never been stronger amongst different sections of society and diverse agree groups in today's Russia. The course will illustrate these cultural and social trends, explore the ways in which the myths and realities of the 1917-1990 period are represented in contemporary Russia and reflect on the causes of this historical revisionism. The course will also give an opportunity to contrast Western perceptions of this phenomenon with Russians' own experience.

#### Presentation of the course:

The course will combine the lecturer's presentations, short films, free discussions, a Q&A session.

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- Develop a deeper understanding of the role of memory and nostalgia in Russian society both in the past and today.
- Explore various elements of Soviet and post-Soviet history, politics and arts that are relevant to this discourse.
- Get a better, more objective, evidence-based understanding of Russia's place in the world today and its complex relationship with the West.
