Dr Esmail lectures at both Oxford and Cambridge. He has been a Research Fellow at Oxford, Visiting Fellow at Harvard, and Burney Student at Cambridge, where he won the Gregg Bury Prize. He has also been awarded a British Academy Studentship.

Alongside international articles, he is the author of two clear, original and best-selling philosophical works on God's nature and existence: God A brief philosophical introduction (2016); God A brief philosophical introduction II (2019)

Dr Esmail has taught courses for the Institute in a number of areas. They include the following: Great Ancient and Medieval Philosophers; Great Modern Philosophers; The Nature of Knowledge; The Problem of Evil; Philosophy of Religion.

Classes with Dr Esmail consist of clearly structured lectures and discussion. Students are assisted to begin to engage critically with the subject.

Course syllabus

Aims:

- To provide an understanding of some of the key elements in the thought of four great medieval philosophers, *viz.* Augustine, Anselm, Aquinas, and al Ghazali;
- To enable students to begin to engage critically with their thought.

Content:

After an introduction, the first session considers Saint Augustine on the matter of God and evil in (especially) his work *On the Free Choice of the Will*.

The second session considers Saint Anselm's ontological argument for the existence of God in the second chapter of his *Proslogion*.

The third session considers Saint Thomas Aquinas on, among other things, form, matter and change and on God in (especially) his *Summa Theologiae*.

The fourth and final session considers al Ghazali on, among other things, God and the matter of occasionalism in his *Moderation in Belief* and *The Healing*.

In each session, there is critical reflection on the thought of these philosophers.

Presentation of the course:

Lectures (principally) and discussion.

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should have:

- An understanding of some of the key elements in the thought of four great medieval philosophers, *viz.* Augustine, Anselm, Aquinas, and al Ghazali;
- An ability to begin to engage critically with their thought.
