Tutor biographies

Dr Lydia Hamlett is Academic Director in History of Art at the Institute of Continuing Education and a Fellow and Director of Studies at Murray Edwards College, University of Cambridge. She has published a book on mural painting in Britain in the long seventeenth century, *Mural Painting in Britain 1630-1730: Experiencing Histories* (Routledge 2020). Lydia previously worked in the museums and heritage sectors, including at Tate, the Fitzwilliam Museum, Kettle's Yard and the National Trust. She co-founded, and is on the steering group for, the British Murals Network.

Amy Lim holds an AHRC Collaborative Doctoral Award at the University of Oxford and Tate, where she is researching aristocratic art patronage and the influence of the late Stuart court. Her research supported the 'British Baroque' exhibition at Tate Britain, 4 February – 19 April 2020, particularly those aspects relating to interiors and gardens. She has published and forthcoming articles on British art, architecture and gardens from the late seventeenth to early twentieth centuries.

Course syllabus Aims:

- To explore the idea of a British Baroque in relation to palace and house interiors;
- To understand the influence of the Royal places on other types of patron;
- To think about the interpretation of interiors within the heritage and museums sectors in the UK.

Content:

The course will begin by exploring the introduction of the Baroque into the British Isles. It will show the influence of the art and architectural patronage of the Stuart monarchs across the century, circa 1630-1730. It will then go on to examine the influence of palace interiors on the houses of key courtly figures. These will include John Cecil, 5th Earl of Exeter, at Burghley House, and the country and town houses of the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire (Chatsworth and Devonshire House) and the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough (Blenheim Palace and Marlborough House). The patronage of the Duke and Duchess of Somerset at Petworth House, West Sussex, will be examined in the last session, in particular in relation to how its interiors were interpreted in the recent exhibition *British Baroque: Power and Illusion* (Tate Britain, 2020).

Presentation of the course:

This course uses lectures and seminars, as well as a site visit to Burghley House, Stamford.

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

- Identify some characteristics of the British Baroque;
- Understand different types of patronage in the period 1630-1730;
- Think creatively around issues relating to gallery and onsite interpretation.
