Course syllabus

Aims:

The course will introduce students to:

- 1) Some of the key Impressionist paintings as well as less well-known, but nevertheless significant, artists who contributed to the movement
- 2) Some of the reasons why Impressionism is considered to be a key moment in the development of modern art

Content:

Join this thematic course to explore French Impressionist paintings by key artists including Monet, Renoir and Morisot. We will also consider less well-known but no less innovative artists in order to understand better the range of works associated with this avant-garde movement.

We will discuss the critical reception of Impressionism during the 1870s and 1880s as well as the broader socio-historical context within which the style developed. The influence of Paris - the capital of art in the 19th century – will be examined particularly as an inspiration for depicting modern life. We will think about the role of models in some of the paintings and we will look at significant works by women artists. Beyond Paris, we will discuss Impressionist paintings of the suburbs and countryside.

Within certain sessions, there will be a spotlight on one or two images where we will look carefully and slowly to unpack paintings. There will be opportunities to discuss ideas and to assess the impact of this ground-breaking moment in the history of modern art.

Presentation of the course:

The course will involve illustrated lectures, group interaction and close looking at key paintings of the period.

As a result of the course, within the constraints of the time available, students should be able to:

1) Identify key painters and characteristics of the Impressionist style.

2) Demonstrate visual analysis skills.

3) Give examples of artists and paintings associated with Impressionism which have been discussed on the course.
